## 4th Sunday of Lent

Repentance. Envy. Joy. Hope. Have you felt these human emotions? Today's Gospel offers a rich story, one we can all find our place in. As we reflect on our own spiritual lives this Lenten season, it can be helpful to imagine ourselves in the story of the Prodigal Son.

"I no longer deserve to be called your son; treat me as you would treat one of your hired workers." The younger son has sinned greatly, betraying his father's trust and squandering his money in sin. Yet the parable turns on his deep repentance and humble return to his father. Is there any area of your life you have been wandering from God or you've squandered good gifts? This Lent, return to the sacrament of Confession! God, a merciful Father, waits for you there.

"While he was still a long way off, his father caught sight of him, and was filled with compassion. He ran to his son, embraced him and kissed him." The father in the parable sees his son's selfishness, perhaps even suspects what he might do, but gives him the inheritance anyway. After his son's departure, the father waits with hope for his son's eventual return. Has someone you love left the Church, made poor decisions, or abused your trust? This Lent is a time to let go of bitterness and to live in hope. Prepare your heart to be merciful!

Not all in the parable invite the mercy of God into their hearts. The self-righteous older brother dishonors his father with his pettiness. "My son, you are here with me always, everything I have is yours." Do you covet what others have? Do you feel as if you've been taken advantage of or that your work goes unseen? This Lent is a time to grow in gratitude. Take a close look at the blessings in our life that you might be missing.

We are all called to repentance. Open your heart to God's personal invitation to growth!

El Padre es modelo de misericordia y perdón. Sabe reconciliar y después del abrazo de bienvenida llega la fiesta a lo grande para el hijo. El Papa Francisco, nos recuerda que "Jesús no describe a un padre ofendido y resentido, un padre que, por ejemplo, dice al hijo: 'me las pagaras, ¡eh!'; no, el padre lo abraza, lo espera con amor. Al contrario, la única cosa que el padre tiene en su corazón es que este hijo este ante él sano y salvo y esto lo hace feliz y hace fiesta". Y el papa agrego. "En cualquier situación de la vida, no debo olvidar que no dejaré jamás de ser hijo de Dios, ser hijo de un Padre que me ama y espera mi regreso. Incluso en las situaciones más feas de la vida, Dios me espera, Dios quiere abrazarme, Dios me espera." (11 de mayo 2016).

## A Message from Fr. Tom

As we look ahead toward the celebration of Easter at the end of Lent—where Jesus Christ, the Son of God becomes our Passover sacrifice—we hear in our first reading that Jewish people celebrate their first Passover after having finally returned to the Promised Land. This is a moment of reconciliation, a theme so important for us in today's Gospel. The entire community of Israel is reconciled to God after more than 400 years of slavery in Egypt and a forty year period of purification in the desert. They are reconciled to God. They celebrate as they finally return home. We should see our 40 days of Lent as our participation in this historical event and saving action of God.

In the Gospel parable of the prodigal son there too is a celebration of reconciliation—a son who once was lost and estranged from his father and family—finally returns home. We learn of the relationship between two brothers and their experience which reveals to them a deeper understanding of their father. We understand the father of the parable as representing God our eternal father. In the two brothers we find misguided attitudes both religious and non-religious toward God the Father in our own time.

The younger brother desires freedom and ability to pursue his desires as he understands them. freedom—separated from the father—leads the younger brother to poverty and misfortune. He acknowledges his faults—at least in terms of them winning back a place for himself as a lowly servant. The embrace that he receives upon returning home transcends his expectations and reveals to him a deeper understanding of the father—and perhaps human freedom as well. The older brother—like so many of us—believes that our good deeds should earn us merit and favor with the father. We can all relate to the consciousness out of which he operates. And so conversely, bad deeds or disloyalty merit punishment and rejection. If we read the Gospel closely, we should see that the older brother is not capable of reflecting upon his own faults-he exaggerates the faults of his brother and claims for himself absolute loyalty to the father; forgetting that just a moment before he refused his father's invitation to reconcile with his brother. This parable is an endless source of reflection for us. We should recognize ourselves in the relationships that the parable gives us. May this Gospel lead us to deeper levels of selfreflection and acceptance of God as a loving and compassionate father.
